### UNC Health Caldwell Community Health Needs Assessment 2022-2023

Adopted by Board Resolution Tuesday April 11<sup>th</sup>, 2023.

#### Dear community member:

At UNC Health Caldwell, we have spent more than 72 years providing high-quality compassionate healthcare to the greater Lenoir community. The "2023 Community Health Needs Assessment" identifies local health and medical needs and provides a plan of how UNC Health Caldwell will respond to such needs. This document illustrates one way we are meeting our obligations to efficiently deliver medical services.

In compliance with the Affordable Care Act, all not-for-profit hospitals are required to develop a report on the medical and health needs of the communities they serve. We welcome you to review this document not just as part of our compliance with federal law, but of our continuing efforts to meet your health and medical needs. UNC Health Caldwell will conduct this effort at least once every three years. The report produced three years ago is also available for your review and comment. As you review this plan, please see if, in your opinion, we have identified the primary needs of the community and if you think our intended response will lead to needed improvements.

We do not have adequate resources to solve all the problems identified. Some issues are beyond the mission of the hospital and action is best suited for a response by others. Some improvements will require personal actions by individuals rather than the response of an organization. We view this as a plan for how we, along with other area organizations and agencies, can collaborate to bring the best each has to offer to support change and to address the most pressing identified needs.

Because this report is a response to a federal requirement of not-for-profit hospitals to identify the community benefit, they provide in responding to documented community need, footnotes are provided to answer specific tax form question; for most purposes, they may be ignored. Most importantly, this report is intended to guide our actions and the efforts of others to make needed health and medical improvements in our area.

I invite your response to this report. As you read, please think about how to help us improve health and medical services in our area. We all live in, work in, and enjoy this wonderful community, and together, we can make our community healthier for every one of us.

THE INPATIENT DIVISION OF JONAS HILL HAS 27 BEDS FOR ADULT INPATIENT BEHAVIORIAL HEALTH HOSPITALIZATION AND IS EQUIPPED TO TREAT A WIDE VARIETY OF CONDITIONS INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO ANXIETY, ATTENTION DEFICIT HYPERACTIVITY DISORDER, BIPOLAR DISORDER, DEPRESSION, POST-TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER AND SCHIZOPHRENIA. THE FACILITY FEATURES A UNIQUE OUTDOOR AREA THAT ALLOWS PATIENTS TO EXERCISE, MEDITATE AND ENJOY SOME FRESH AIR. IN THE SUMMER OF 2021 AN OUTPATIENT CLINIC WAS OPENED TO COMPLEMENT AND ADD TO THE SERVICES PROVIDED BY JONAS HILL. THE CLINIC OFFERS CONTINUING CARE FOR ADULT INPATIENTS AS WELL AS OUTPATIENT CARE FOR ADOLESCENTS. THE CLINIC PROVIDES SUPPORT FOR PATIENTS AND FAMILIES DURING THEIR RECOVERY. SERVICES PROVIDED INCLUDE BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO MEDICATION MANAGEMENT; INDIVDUAL THERAPY AND COUNSELING; GROUP THERAPY AND COUNSELING; AND FAMILY THERAPY AND COUNSELING. KNOWING THAT MENTAL HEALTH WAS IDENTIFIED DURING THE LAST COMMUNITY HEALTH ASSESSMENT AND DURING THE CURRENT YEAR'S ASSESSMENT, IT IS OUR HOPE THAT OUR POSITIVE IMPACT ON THE MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY WILL CONTINUE TO INCREASE.

UNC HEALTH CALDWELL'S PARTICIPATION IN THIS SURVEY IS PART OF A COLLABORATIVE EFFORT WITH MULTIPLE PUBLIC SERVICE GROUPS WITHIN CALDWELL COUNTY. SURVEYS WERE DISPERSED THROUGHOUT OUR HOSPITAL, TO BOTH PATIENTS AND VISITORS THAT RESIDE WITHIN CALDWELL COUNTY. THESE SURVEYS WERE INCLUDED IN THE REST OF THE SURVEYS SENT THROUGH THE COMMUNITY. IT IS OUR GOAL TO HELP SERVE ALL PEOPLE RESIDING OR PASSING THROUGH OUR COUNTY, WITH A SPECIAL FOCUS AS TO HOW WE PROVIDE CARE TO THOSE WHO ARE MEDICALLY UNDERSERVED. ### **Executive Summary**

### **Overview**

In order for UNC Health Caldwell to better serve the community, understanding the significant needs are critical. A Community Health Needs Assessment has been performed to address the community's needs, develop an implementation strategy to organize how these needs can be met, and fulfill federal requirements.

Respectable secondary source data was used to illustrate the community and its needs. A widely available public survey was launched in order to have broad responses from community members. A select focus group was used in order to have feedback about the results from the public survey, commentary about the previous CHNA, and if the newly and previously identified needs are a priority.

### **Priority Determination**

On November 1st, 2022, the Community Health Assessment Advisory Committee reviewed all data collected from numerous outside sources and the community health assessment opinion survey to determine Caldwell County's top three health priorities for the next three years. Each member ranked the priorities from 1 to 5 based on the magnitude, seriousness of consequences, and overall feasibility (5 being the priority with the highest magnitude, seriousness, and overall feasibility). There was an open discussion following the rankings. The top three priorities chosen for the 2022 Caldwell County Community Health Assessment are:

1. Substance Abuse/Use: The World Health Organization refers to substance misuse as the harmful or hazardous use of psychoactive substances, including alcohol and illicit drugs. Substance abuse or substance misuse is concerning in Caldwell County. Substances can be classified as Opiates, including heroin, morphine, and opium; Amphetamines including methamphetamine; barbiturates, marijuana, and cocaine, prescription drugs, narcotics, alcohol, and tobacco.

2. Mental Health: Mental Health, as defined by the World Health Organization, is a state of well-being in which every individual realizes his or her potential, can cope with the normal stresses of life, can work productively and fruitfully, and can contribute to her or his community. Mental Health can be recognized as anxiety, stress, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), Autism, Bipolar Disorder, depression, eating disorders, obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), post-traumatic stress disorder, schizophrenia, etc. (from NAMI). Mental health is also correlated with suicide. Caldwell County will also focus on decreasing suicide rates as part of the mental health priority.

3. Transportation: Transportation choices we make play an important role in building and maintaining healthy communities. For example, safer roadways and traffic patterns reduce crashes. Streets, where walkers and bikers are protected from motor vehicles, encourage people to get more exercise as part of their daily routines. Increasing the transportation options available in a community helps reduce congestion and air pollution.

### **Background/Introduction**

The 2022 CHA was led by the Caldwell County Health Department, with collaboration among various other agencies within the County of Caldwell. The data presented within this assessment represents the most updated data available before publication. Following the collection of 631 opinion surveys, the Caldwell County Health Department conducted several advisory committee meetings and focus groups. These assemblies were hosted to further the community-driven process and gain a well-rounded understanding of community members' and stakeholders' thoughts on specific health priorities.

### **Data Collection**

To ensure the greatest quality of the CHA, both primary data (collected directly, including surveys and focus group data) and secondary data (collected from other sources) were utilized. To achieve this, the Caldwell County Community Health Assessment Advisory Committee conducted the following assessment process:

•Created a Community Health Assessment Opinion Survey that was used to collect primary data.

oPartnered with the Caldwell County court system to distribute surveys to individuals selected for jury duty

 Survey was also available online, at the Caldwell County Library, Granite Falls Public Library, Granite Falls Emergency Services Facility, Lenoir Soup Kitchen, Martin Luther King Jr. Community Center, Lenoir Housing Authority, Family Resource Center, Helping Hands Clinic, Caldwell County Offices, and the Caldwell County Health Department

- o Over 600 individuals completed the Opinion survey
- Conducted 4 focus groups:

• The CHA committee selected groups that would represent a variety of socioeconomic and demographic groups in Caldwell County.

- Adult: County employees
- Low-income/minority: participants from Yokefellow
- Teen: students from GED Program
- Senior-Adult: participants from the Lenoir Housing Authority

 Participants of these groups were solicited by email, fliers, and other established groups

• Researched secondary data from several resources which included but were not limited to:



### **Priority Selection**

During phase one of the CHA process, planning team members brought forth ten priorities to the advisory committee. These priorities came from the community health assessment opinion survey. Graphs 1, 2, 3, and 4 show the survey results for the top ten priorities listed in the survey. Five priorities were chosen by the advisory committee using an impact matrix (Graph 5). Impact, output, current resources, and current programs were all measured to determine where each priority would fall on the matrix. The five priorities which were chosen were substance abuse/use, mental health, transportation, preventative care, and chronic disease.





# What Health Services Need the Most Improvement in Caldwell County?



# What Unhealthy Behaviors are the Most Common in Caldwell County?




# What is the Most Important Health Concern the Community Needs Information About?

During Phase two of the CHA process, members of the advisory committee worked with individuals of different demographic and socioeconomic groups to organize focus groups. During these four focus sessions, qualitative and quantitative data were collected on each of the five priorities. 

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

### **Populations at Risk**

Health issues affect communities on multiple levels; individually, economically, socially, and spiritually. After collecting primary, secondary, and focus group data, the advisory committee identified several at-risk populations which experience access issues to health care and the possibility of decreased health and wellness in Caldwell County. These groups include:

### Low income


o Across the lifespan, residents of impoverished communities are at increased risk for mental illness, chronic disease, higher mortality, and lower life expectancy. Children make up the largest age group of those experiencing poverty. Childhood poverty is associated with developmental delays, toxic stress, chronic illness, and nutritional deficits. Individuals who experience childhood poverty are more likely to experience poverty into adulthood, which contributes to generational cycles of poverty. In addition to the lasting effects of childhood poverty, adults living in poverty are at a higher risk of adverse health effects from obesity, smoking, substance use, and chronic stress. Older adults with lower incomes experience higher rates of disability and mortality. One study found that men and women in the top 1 percent of income were expected to live 14.6 and 10.1 years longer respectively than men and women in the bottom 1 percent.

Uninsured

Olnadequate health insurance coverage is one of the largest barriers to healthcare access. Out-of-pocket medical care costs may lead individuals to delay or forgo needed care (such as doctor visits, dental care, and medications), and medical debt is common among both insured and uninsured individuals. People with lower incomes are often uninsured, and minority groups account for over half of the uninsured population. Lack of health insurance coverage may negatively affect health. Uninsured adults are less likely to receive preventive services for chronic conditions such as diabetes, cancer, and cardiovascular disease. Similarly, children without health insurance coverage are less likely to receive appropriate treatment for conditions like asthma or critical preventive services such as dental care, immunizations, and wellchild visits that track developmental milestones.

• Elderly

oThe increase in the number of older adults in the United States is unprecedented. In 2019, 54.1 million US adults were 65 or older, representing 16% of the population. Older adults make up nearly 25% of the US population. Aging increases the risk of chronic diseases such as dementia, heart disease, type 2 diabetes, arthritis, and cancer. These are the nation's leading drivers of illness, disability, death, and health care costs. The risk of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias increases with age, and these conditions are most common in adults 65 and older. In 2021, health care and long-term care costs associated with Alzheimer's and other dementias were \$355 billion, making them some of the costliest conditions to society.


### **History of Caldwell County**

Caldwell County, located in the Mountain region of western North Carolina, was formed from Burke and Wilkes Counties in 1841. It was named for Joseph Caldwell, the first president of the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. Early inhabitants of Caldwell County included Cherokee and Siouan Indians, followed by German, Scotch-Irish, and English settlers. The county seat, Lenoir, was incorporated in 1851 and named for Revolutionary War general William Lenoir. Other communities in Caldwell County include Hudson, Granite Falls, Rhodhiss (on the Burke County line), Cajah Mountain, and Gamewell. Part of Blowing Rock is also in Caldwell County. The mountainous terrain attracts thousands of tourists to Caldwell County each year, and a large portion of the county is covered by the Blue Ridge Mountains and Pisgah National Forest. The Catawba, Yadkin, and Little Rivers flow through the county. Caldwell County is one of the leading producers of furniture in the world. Other manufactured products include labels and tape, twines, yarn, thread and, cordage. Agricultural products from Caldwell County include broilers, hatching eggs, hay, soybeans, oats, barley, and landscape nursery plants.

The Caldwell County Health Department was established in 1950 as a free clinic. Before 1950, Caldwell County was part of the Burke-Caldwell Health District. Today, the Caldwell County Health Department serves the residents of Caldwell County at the Health and Human Services Building in Lenoir, NC. They employ around 60 employees including clinics, Women's Health and School Health Nurses, Health Educators, Social Workers, Physicians, Environmental Health Specialists, a Dentist, Dental Assistants, Nutritionists, and administrative/support staff. From 2017 to 2021, CCHD served over 30,624 patients in the clinical areas.


### Today in Caldwell County








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The graph below shows the percentage of individuals below the FPL in Caldwell County by race and ethnicity from 2010 to 2020. In 2020, the percentage of individuals below 100% (federal poverty line) in Caldwell County was 39.5%. The population with the highest percentage of individuals below the FPL was Black (32.8%), while the population with the lowest was White (non-Hispanic) (12.7%).





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

Graph 12: Chemical and waste pollution in Caldwell County is an area of concern. As shown below, Caldwell County ranks in the 90Th percentile for air releases of known developmental toxins and the 70Th percentile for air releases of recognized carcinogens. Percentages are ranked with zero percent being the cleanest and 100 percent being the dirtiest county.

Graph 13: As shown below, Caldwell County ranks in the 80th percentile for volatile organic compound emissions (e.g., chemicals, paints, and pesticides), and in the 70th percentile for sulfur dioxide emissions (e.g., fuel combustion, fires, solvents, and dust). Overall, Caldwell County is average for its air quality.

### **Morbidity and Mortality**


Morbidity and Mortality are ongoing concerns for all counties and states. When looking at morbidity and mortality or the incidence of disease it is important to look at modifiable and non-modifiable behaviors. During the CHA action planning sessions, Caldwell County Health Department and partners will be referring to those behaviors to ensure that Caldwell County citizens are aware of and have access to needed services and education to decrease morbidity and mortality. The State Center for Health Statistics compiles the top 10 leading causes of death each year. Caldwell County's top ten leading causes of death show that heart disease and cancer consistently fall at the top of the list. This has been consistent for several years. In 2019 there were 224 deaths related to heart disease and 209 deaths from cancer. Heart Disease and Cancer alone contributed to an average of over 904,855 years of potential life lost in the State of North Carolina in 2018. Caldwell County had an average of over 6,155 potential life lost in 2018.

### Areas of Success


The Caldwell County Advisory Committee is pleased to report that Caldwell County has a few areas to celebrate success. The county has made tremendous strides in reducing rates or maintaining them below the state level. As teen pregnancy was not a priority in the last cycle, the teen pregnancy rate decreased from 2019 to 2020, as shown in Graph 14. This is an excellent trend since teen pregnancies are associated with a decrease in high school graduation rates, lower income, and premature births.

### Infant Mortality Success and Concern

In January 2016, Caldwell County Health Department partnered with the Family Resource Center and started working on decreasing infant mortality in Caldwell County. An Infant Mortality Reduction (IMR) grant was awarded to local health departments in North Carolina to implement evidence-based strategies to decrease infant mortality in the communities they serve. With these grant funds, we were able to purchase and promote initiatives within the health department, as well as safe sleep and tobacco cessation. In collaboration with the community through a community action team, we conducted training for providers and had community events. Graph 15 shows the decrease in the infant death rate in Caldwell County.



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
### Areas of Concern

While there are areas that have proved successful, there are a few areas of concern for the citizens of Caldwell County. As a result of the 2017 health assessment and research of secondary data, the Caldwell Advisory Committee noted several health indicators that need considerable improvement. Caldwell County has seen an increase in death rates among trachea, bronchus & lung cancers over the past several years. The rate is nearly 70 per 100,000 residents in Caldwell County compared to the state is just 55 per 100,000 and declining (graph 16). In general, cancer could be related to personal lifestyle, environmental factors, or non-modifiable factors. Examples could include but are not limited to age, gender, family history, tobacco use, alcohol, sunlight, obesity, cancer-causing substances, chronic inflammation, hormones, immunosuppression, infectious agents, radiation, and diet. These specific areas were identified as focus points this year and strategies will be included in the preventative care action plan.





Caldwell County has seen an increase in the death rate due to chronic liver disease and cirrhosis within the last few years. In 2015, chronic liver disease and cirrhosis made the top ten leading causes of death. Graph 17 shows the slight increase Caldwell County has seen over the past eight years, compared to North Carolina's chronic liver disease and cirrhosis death rate. Caldwell County had a rate of 14.8 in 2011-2015; in 2015-2019, the rate had increased to 18.5. For North Carolina, the rate was 10.1 in 2011-2015, and in 2015-2019, the rate was 10.6. Graph 18 compares Caldwell County to peer counties.






Another area of concern is the suicide rate in Caldwell County. The suicide rate in Caldwell County from 2013 to 2019 was 18.5 per 100,000 population. Graph 19 also maps out surrounding counties and their suicide rate based on a color scale. Suicide was part of the action plan for the 2017 CHA and will continue to be for the 2022 CHA. Suicide can be caused by many factors, lack of community mental health resources, substance abuse/misuse, economy, etc.

### **Chronic Disease Prevention and Management**

Chronic Disease accounts for over half of the top ten leading causes of death in Caldwell County, such as heart disease, cancer, respiratory disease, diabetes, etc. Currently, Caldwell County has resources in place to combat these issues. Caldwell County shows an increase over the years as shown in graph 20. Risk factors include age, gender, weight, tobacco use, genetic composition, physical activity, etc.


# **Top Health Priorities**

## Transportation

There are many forms of transportation. Transportation forms range from walking to driving. Walking is the most ancient form of transportation and the most common. Based on the 2021 U.S. Census Bureau, Caldwell County's population size is 80,463. About 32,000 of those individuals either drove or walked to work. Approximately 40% of the Caldwell County population had transportation. So, what about the other 60% of Caldwell County?

In 2018, 33,880 individuals worked in Caldwell County. 32,775 individuals either drove a truck, van, or car to work. Roughly 29,000 individuals drove alone and roughly 3,000 individuals carpooled with at least 2 other individuals to work. About 40 individuals used public transportation in 2018. To say the least, transportation plays a critical role in completing day-to-day tasks. Now there are transportation services here in Caldwell County. There are smaller organizations that do help with transportation and the two major transportation services are Greenway and Blue Ridge. These transportation services are public and can be utilized by anyone in Caldwell County. These services primarily focus on accessible individuals and the impoverished population of Caldwell County.

60% of the Caldwell County population does not have access to transportation. Access to transportation is important because it allows a community to grow and thrive. Transportation allows access to health-promoting services and supports healthcare itself. Research has shown that lack of transportation can result in missed or delayed healthcare appointments and result in poorer health outcomes and increased health expenditures. Inadequate transportation services can increase social isolation, particularly in the older population and individuals with disabilities or even individuals who do not drive. This can increase the risk of many health diseases such as early mortality, depression, and dementia. It is important that transportation is utilized because it can lead to better health outcomes. Strategies to help improve transportation could start with the bike and pedestrian masterplans. These plans can establish a framework to increase walking and biking trails and improve the connectivity of non-auto paths and trails in a particular area. Another strategy is to complete street and streetscapes design initiatives. Caldwell County could enhance its streetscape with greater sidewalk coverage and walkway connectivity, street crossing safety features, traffic calming measures, and other designed elements to improve transportation options.



Graph 21: The graph below outlines the variety of transportation per number of households.


# **Substance Misuse and Abuse**

In 2022, Caldwell County had 247 overdoses. According to graph 20, Caldwell dramatically increased drug overdose deaths from 2018-2021. Compared to our peer counties, Burke, Rockingham, and Lee County, these results are similar. This can be from a variety of reasons, stress, anxiety, economy, result from injury, etc. Of the individuals who indicated in the 2022 Community Health Assessment survey that they or a family member used a substance abuse drug, nearly 27% did not know where the drugs were coming from. One contributing factor is the rising opioid epidemic.

To fight this issue of drug overdoses and abuse/misuse of drugs, Caldwell County is utilizing resources to fight the opioid epidemic. One way is through Operation Medicine Drop (OMD). Caldwell County has drop box locations at Caldwell County Sheriff's Office, Lenoir Police Department, Hudson Police Department, and Granite Falls Police Department. Restart program which aims at addressing substance misuse in the community.

When looking at substance abuse and misuse, risky behaviors associated with drug use/ misuse must also be examined. Risky behaviors can cause an increased possibility of contracting infections or diseases such as HIV, hepatitis, and tuberculosis. According to The North Carolina State Center of Health Statistics, in 2020, there were three acute Hepatitis C cases, based on case definition of labs and symptom criteria. This is a slight decrease from 2019 when Caldwell County had seven acute cases. The number of chronic hepatitis C cases presumed to be alive in North Carolina in 2020 was 681. The highest rates of newly diagnosed acute hepatitis C occurred among the 25 to 39-year-old age group, which accounted for 64% of the total acute hepatitis C cases.


Caldwell County's main goal in the coming years is to decrease substance misuse within the county and take unwanted substances out of homes. Working with community agencies such as Restart, Drug-Free Caldwell, law enforcement, healthcare, faith-based organizations, pharmacies, etc., the shared goal is to prevent the misuse of prescription drugs and overdoses, educate the community on the importance of disposing of unwanted medications at the drop box locations, encourage individuals to lock up medications and provide access to naloxone to the community. This will be outlined in this year's Action Plan.





# **Mental Health**


The suicide death rate in Caldwell County for 2021 was 54.8, which was lower than the peer counties of Wilkes, Surry, Burke, and Rockingham counties. Between 2015 and 2019 there have been 73 suicide deaths in Caldwell County. Between 2017 and 2019, suicide/intentional self-harm was not even on the list of leading causes of death in Caldwell County. While resources have increased for mental health, the need still exists in Caldwell County for mental health services. After the 2017 Caldwell County Community Health Assessment, community partners focused on providing adequate resources to the public to reduce the stigma surrounding mental health conditions and working towards increasing the support that is in place to provide help to those suffering. Caldwell UNC Healthcare did this by providing outpatient depression screenings at all clinics, providing mental health screenings in the emergency department, and mental health meetings held quarterly at the hospital that includes the local department of social services, local police department, and Vaya Health. Other resources include having a mental health counselor recruited to assist with the placement of patients presenting with mental health issues in the emergency department and access to a resource guide in all clinics to help patients access healthcare services, specifically, mental health services. Community partners that also worked towards decreasing suicide and targeting mental health disparities included Caldwell County Health Department, Project Lazarus, a regional collaboration, to help address issues of prescription drug abuse, VAYA Health, RHA Health Services, and Jonas Hill. In 2016, the Caldwell County Comprehensive Care Center, a fullservice behavioral health care center in Lenoir, opened to provide 24hour mental health and addiction urgent care, outpatient behavioral health treatment, and beds for people in crisis. The center offers 24hour mental health and addiction urgent care, outpatient behavioral health treatment, and 12 beds for people in crisis, regardless of insurance status.

The Caldwell County Health Department provides a variety of resources as well. These include support for: emotional well-being, psychological well-being, and social well-being. Some aspects that impact mental health are adequate housing, safe neighborhoods, equitable jobs and wages, quality education, and equity in access to quality health care. Depression can include the following symptoms: being in a sad mood, loss of pleasurable activities, fatigue, feelings of guilt, and recurring thoughts about death. Depression correlates with adverse health behaviors such as smoking, alcohol consumption, physical inactivity, and sleep disturbance.

A characteristic of anxiety is excessive or unrealistic worrying about everyday events and tasks. Phobias or fears can cause individuals to feel anxious such as seeing a snake or flying in an airplane. Obsessivecompulsive disorder (OCD) is an anxiety disorder with recurrent thoughts or behaviors. Anxiety disorders can be treated with pharmacotherapies and by addressing exposure and response prevention. Psychotic disorders occur when individuals experience the deregulation of thought processes. Schizophrenia is a psychotic disorder where individuals have symptoms of delusion and hallucinations. Psychotic disorders are usually treated with antipsychotic medications and forms of psychosocial interventions. Bipolar disorder is considered a major mood disorder where individuals experience episodes of depression and mania. Elevated, unrestrained, or irritable moods often occur with this mental illness. Some effective treatments for this disorder include medication and psychotherapy.

Of the 2,423 overall violent deaths in North Carolina in 2020, 1,436 were suicides and 91 were youth suicides ranging from ages 10 to 19. Males had a higher suicide rate per 100,000 than females. The suicide rate makes up 85% of the overall violent deaths in North Carolina for those 85 years and older. Graph 25 shows the suicide trends and demographics in North Carolina between 2016 and 2020.




#### North Carolina Suicide Deaths, 5-year Rate






The graphs below show the suicide death percentages associated with different circumstances and are also broken down by sex.



### The Caldwell House

The Caldwell House provides structure, responsibility, and accountability which are key to a person's recovery. The House accepts only those persons who have completed at least 4 weeks of in-patient substance abuse treatment. The residents are adult males only. Residents accepted to the Caldwell House can benefit from its therapeutic program as they learn how to re-enter society in a safe and healthy environment. Intake procedures include reviewing assessments (which helps identifies maladapted behavior or the presence of other conditions, which may cause susceptibility to abuse by self or others) and going over treatment and aftercare plans to determine if the resident meets program admission criteria. Individuals who do not meet certain admission criteria may not be accepted to the House. An average stay at Caldwell House is between 8 and 12 months. The House requires at least a 4-month commitment from residents and active involvement in the implementation of aftercare plans and employment.
